# **COP 28 Conference**

To coincide with November's global COP 28 conference, St Mary's were delighted to be invited to take part in a mock secondary school version at West Lancashire Council Chambers Wednesday 29th November. We were joined by 7 other schools and a 6th form college from the Liverpool Archdiocese, who came together to debate and question the climate future of 16 nations. Each team had a 1 minute opening statement to outline current climate change threats, and how their country is already



responding in mitigation and adaptation to ensure the global average temperature remains well below the 2 degrees agreed in the 2015 UN Paris Agreement.

St Mary's pupils formed 2 of the delegates, Senegal and Chile. Each team confidently delivered a punchy speech, supported by factual research to justify their actions and passion for reducing climate change impacts. Next came the round of Q&A. All delegates had to prepare questions to challenge other nations on their contribution to net zero targets and engage in a sophisticated and mature, global debate. I was hugely impressed by the quality of the questions asked and the attention to detail in challenging those countries who are not doing enough! St Mary's speeches were so watertight that no other country wished to challenge either of the opening statements! Our pupils were an absolute credit to themselves and our school!

After lunch, the pupils began collaborating with other schools on global topics, facilitated by St John Rigby college students. This was followed by a panel of guest speakers from CAFOD to Edge Hill University, explaining how their job roles help to tackle climate change. We concluded the day with a focused discussion on how as a school can each instil sustainability at an individual, local and national level. We were joined by a very special guest, the Mayor of West Lancashire, who popped by to thank the pupils for participating and to remind them how amazing and important their roles are today and in the future. The pupils have brought back many ideas that St Mary's and the community beyond can look to promote. This was shared during a breakfast meeting with Mrs Brahms.

Holly said: COP 28 was a really interactive and engaging experience. I personally enjoyed the day and believe it was a really positive experience and that we should go again, as it is our duty as humans to continue to look after our planet".

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Ofsted

As we go into winter, common illnesses can keep children and teenagers away from their classmates and studies. One of the best things we can all do to avoid illness is to practice good hand hygiene.

Good hand hygiene helps stop infections from spreading, which means less disrupted learning time.

Teach your child to wash hands properly for 20 seconds and stay away from others when sick. The <u>e-bug resources</u> for all ages can help you to explain and discuss hygiene habits – and why they are important - to your child or teenager.

To avoid catching bugs or passing it on to others wash your hands frequently and thoroughly with soap and warm water. This is most important following an episode of diarrhoea or vomiting, after using the toilet, before eating or preparing food, after changing nappies, as well as cleaning up vomit or diarrhoea. Alcohol-based hand sanitisers are not effective against some infections.

Anyone who has diarrhoea and/or vomiting should stay at home. Do not return to work or send children to school until 48 hours after the symptoms have stopped and do not visit your GP or hospital while symptomatic.
